2022 IN REVIEW

2022 was an exciting year for the Criminal Justice Coordinating Council (CJCC). CJCC began planning for an office expansion in 2020. The planning came to fruition with the end of the renovations in 2022. The expanded office space enables CJCC to host meetings on the 17th floor of One Government Center with technology to meet current needs. Additionally, the expansion enabled CJCC to better group employees in spaces that meets each team's needs.

CICC has continued its participation in several national initiatives. The National Network of Criminal Justice Coordinating Councils (NNCJCC) provides a forum for local CJCCs to build local capacity for system improvement. I was selected as a subject matter expert for the CICC National Standards and Essential elements. The project was funded by the National Institute of Corrections (NIC) and coordinated by the Justice Management Institute (JMI). This project will serve as a guide for communities to create or enhance their CJCCs. Lucas County, under the leadership of the Lucas County Commissioners, has continued as a Safety + Justice Challenge implementation site. Through the hard work of the Safety + Justice Challenge Core Planning Team, Strategy Owners, and Sponsors, and project partners, as of Quarter Four 2022, Lucas County has achieved a 37.2% overall reduction in the local jail population. CJCC has continued to develop strategies to increase the capacity for cross-system information sharing at the local level. To further enhance this work, Lucas County is a member of the NACO Peer Learning Network. The Peer Learning Network provides access to resources and tools to increase cross-system information sharing capacity. As part of focus on the intersection of behavioral health and criminal justice, Lucas County has been selected as an Innovator County for implementing Stepping Up's three-step approach to collect and analyze timely data on the prevalence of people in their jails who have serious mental illnesses (SMI). These steps include establishing a shared SMI definition for their Stepping Up efforts across criminal justice and behavioral health systems, ensuring everyone booked into jail is screened for mental illnesses, and regular reporting on this population. Lucas County is the second county in Ohio to receive this designation.

NORIS has continued to evolve and has been developing applications for the Court Diagnostic and Treatment Facility (CDTF), the Domestic Violence High Risk Team (DVHRT), and the Justice Reinvestment Initiative (JRI). NORIS continues to refine existing applications including E-forms and NORIS SocialWISE.

The 2022 CJCC annual report provides a look back on the many accomplishments of the CJCC. This work will provide a strong foundation for the work that lies ahead.




CJCC National Standards

Holly Matthews, Executive Director, served as a Subject Matter Expert for the development of the CJCC National Standards and CJCC Essential Elelements. Both documents were published by the National Institute of Corrections and developed by JMI.

The National Standards for Criminal Justice Coordinating Councils (CJCC) is a comprehensive framework for the formation and management of CJCCs. The standards consist of 13 core elements for CJCCS.

The standards are accompanied by the CJCC essential elements which consist of ten key attributes associated with high performing CJCCs





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
jail reduction since the establishment of the Lucas County Baseline in 2015.

GRANTS management

CJCC Grants Management staff strives to continue the long tradition of administering federal grant funds successfully through providing financial, programmatic, and technical assistance. The Allocation Review Committee (ARC) is comprised of individuals who represent various criminal justice and community agencies throughout Lucas County. The committee continues to implement the use of a local funding plan (the ARC Strategic Plan) which is instrumental in the development of local projects that aim to enhance and strengthen our local criminal justice system.







Allocation Review Committee (ARC)

The ARC is a standing, special purpose advisory committee of the CICC. ARC members are charged with the following responsibilities: reviewing funding requests for local criminal justice system projects; developing local funding plans for program allocations for recommendation to the CICC; monitoring performance and accomplishments of funded programs and reporting outcome results to the CJCC. The CJCC appoints the ARC Chairman approves committee members.

Justice Assistance Grant (JAG)

JAG is a cornerstone federal crime-fighting program, supporting the federal government's crucial role in spurring innovation, as well as testing and replicating evidence-based practices nationwide. States and local communities use these funds to address needs and fill gaps across their entire criminal and juvenile justice systems, including prevention, enforcement, courts, prosecution, indigent defense, corrections, crisis intervention and behavioral health services for justice involved persons, victim assistance, and other community supports.

Title II Funding:

In 1974, Congress enacted the Juvenile Justice & Delinquency Prevention Act (the Act). From the Act, the Federal Office of Juvenile Justice and Delinquency Prevention (OJJDP) and the Title II Formula Grant program were created. The purpose of the Title II program is to assist communities in addressing juvenile crime and delinquency at the local level. Based on the statewide guidance, Title II funds in Ohio will be used to implement programs that will reduce racial and ethnic disparities (RED) in the juvenile justice system.

Reentry

The Reentry Committee of the Criminal Justice Coordinating Council (CJCC) will provide leadership on public policy, alignment and coordination of criminal justice systems, and resources to support reentry efforts in Lucas County. Additionally, the Reentry Committee will work in partnership with the Reentry Coalition of Northwest Ohio (RCNWO) to secure broad community input, build partnerships, and assure a well-coordinated system of care and support to assist previously incarcerated men, women, and youth with successful integration back into the community.

NATIONAL SECOND CHANCE MONTH

Since its adoption in 2017 by Prison Fellowship, April has been celebrated as National Second Chance Month by several Presidential administrations, the US Senate and over 600 US partner organizations. The CJCC and Reentry Coalition of Northwest Ohio (RCNWO) celebrated National Second Chance Month in April by hosting a number of events. The largest two events were the Reentry Simulations hosted in collaboration between the CJCC, RCNWO, and the Lucas County Adult Probation Department. Each of the simulations were half-day events and were well attended. Reentry advocates and probation staff helped man the "agency" tables and participants -all five Lucas County Courts had staff attend – were tasked with challenges that individuals face when returning home from incarceration. The Sylvania Municipal Court closed their Court for a half day so all court staff could attend.

GOING HOME TO STAY AT THE ART MUSEUM

2022 was the beginning of a new partnership between the CJCC, RCNWO and the Toledo Museum of Art. In June, the monthly Going Home to Stay program (aka First Wednesday's) was held in the Glass Pavilion at the Museum. Planning for this event began in 2021 which allowed this event to be highly successful and hopefully an annual tradition. The event kicked off with a great welcome for the participants in the Glass Salon and then participants were able to visit resource providers who had set up tables throughout the main hall of the Pavilion. Over 90 individuals were helped at the event and the Museum offered free tickets to tour the Pavilion and to see the glass blowing demonstration that afternoon. To ensure the event went smoothly both Goodwill Industries of NW Ohio and Empowered for Excellence offered shuttle buses to get people that showed up at Government Center to the Art Museum.

PALM BEACH REENTRY SUMMIT

In early 2022 the CJCC submitted a competitive proposal to the Palm Beach Reentry Summit selection committee and was asked to present at the Summit in October 2022. The presentation was to highlight Going Home to Stay and the Toledo Municipal Court Reentry Docket. The presenters were Judge Kuhlman, Holly Matthews and Tom Luettke. The breakout section was filled to capacity and the presentation was well received.

2016 Co-Occurring Disorders Grant (SCA 16)

The FY16 SCA Co-Occurring grant is building partnerships to ensure a well-coordinated system of care and support to assist returning citizens with Co-Occurring Disorders leaving the Correctional Treatment Facility (CTF) to successfully integrate into the community. COVID-19 severely impacted grant activities and referrals. In 2021, Above and Beyond Care Behavioral Health (ABC) began providing case management and mentoring services. There have been 140 referrals to the grant for services since the start date.

2019 Justice Reinvestment Initiative Grant (JRI)

JRI is funding the development of a database to house Ohio Department of Rehabilitation and Correction (ODRC) data on all individuals returning to Lucas County. The ODRC data will include inmate details, release dates, and ancillary information. Law enforcement and reentry service providers will have access to this information upon signing an MOU. The project funds a NORIS programmer to create and enhance the database. Additionally, JRI funding will be used for the NORIS data center redesign. The redesign will allow NORIS to consolidate multiple servers into three super servers.

2019 Innovative Reentry Initiative Grant (IRI)

In 2021, the IRI grant began an overall assessment of the reentry system in Lucas County. Midwest Evaluation and Research (MER) met with key stakeholders, conducted interviews, and attended an in-person CJCC Reentry Committee meeting. Part of the assessment includes a survey of Lucas County reentry agencies. The RIDGE project has provided the TYRO Moms and TYRO Dads curriculum to Correctional Treatment Facility (CTF) residents. MER is conducting a randomized control study of the program, working with 101 participants in the treatment group, and 55 in the control group. Two participants have been approved for Housing Choice Vouchers through Lucas Metropolitan Housing.

2020 National Evaluation Participation Grant

Lucas County has been selected to participate in the National Second Chance Act evaluation. Georgia State University (GSU) will complete a comprehensive evaluation of the effectiveness of the reentry services provided by the 2019 IRI grant. The final cross-site evaluation will be presented to Congress in 2025. GSU visited Lucas County for a second site visit in September of 2022 to learn about the Lucas County criminal justice system, current initiatives, and NORIS data capabilities.

Peer Learning Network (PLN)-Peer Exchange

The Peer Learning Network's goal is to reduce the number of individuals with mental illness involved in the justice system. Through participation in the PLN, Lucas County has developed an action plan focused on cross system information sharing. PLN members have received technical assistance from other sites, partners, and strategic allies within the John D. and Catherine T. MacArthur Foundation's SJC network, Stepping Up, and the Familiar Faces Initiative (formerly Data-Driven Justice).

Through the PLN, Lucas County delegates visited Pima County, Arizona to learn about their behavioral health continuum of care. Lucas County hosted 20 County leaders and healthcare officials on October 25 and 26, 2022. Participants learned about Lucas County's work at the intersection of behavioral health and criminal justice.



Innovator County

The Stepping Up Initiative is a national initiative to reduce the overincarceration of people with mental illnesses. Lucas County has been a member of the Stepping Up Initiative since 2016, as local leaders have committed to reducing the prevalence of people who have mental illnesses in the local jail population. In 2022, Lucas County was named as one of a select group of Stepping Up Innovator Counties in the United States. Nearly 500 counties in 43 states have committed to participating in the Stepping Up initiative, but few are chosen for the distinction of being named as an Innovator County. Lucas County is the 18th county in the country to earn the distinction, and only the second county in Ohio.

The Northwest Ohio Regional Information System (NORIS) was founded in 1974 to provide records automation and information sharing among jurisdictions in Lucas County, Ohio and has grown to serve 114 criminal justice agencies in Lucas County and surrounding counties of Northwest Ohio. In 2022 NORIS supported over 3,700 end-users and over 2,300 terminals on the NORIS network. NORIS has a staff of 33 employees that provide both hardware and software application development support to meet the specific needs of the local, regional, state and federal agencies within Lucas County and the surrounding area. The NORIS data warehouse contains more than 900,000,000 criminal justice records.

NORIS processes approximately 14 million transactions per month and maintains criminal histories on over 1,000,000 people in addition to offering on-line access to over 100,000 active warrants.

NORIS has proven to be a valuable, cost-effective resource for law enforcement, court, corrections, and probation agencies.

NORIS is governed by the Criminal Justice Coordinating Council (CJCC). Members of the CJCC server on the NORIS Advisory Committee (NAC) to review policies regarding budgeting, operation, and procedure(s) for NORIS in order to sustain the operation and maintenance of an integrated network of applications used by multiple law enforcement, court, corrections agencies in addition to criminal justice related services.

NORIS applications



Access to up-to-date information within the criminal justice system is critical to the successful operation of law enforcement, courts, corrections, parole and probation agencies in addition to criminal just related services such as mental health and evaluation services, drug treatment programs and other needed outreach services. Integration of this data is key to the success of NORIS. The NORIS network of applications provides a cohesive inter-connectivity of criminal justice records between law enforcement, courts, probation, corrections and other criminal justice related data using the Regional Identifier (RID). The RID is a unique person-based identifier assigned at the time of initial entry into the NORIS system, allowing for a fluid integration among applications. easy automation of routine processes and overall information sharing among multiple agencies. Integration of the NORIS information allows for enduser tracking of a person's progress throughout the entire criminal justice process. While integration is the cornerstone of the NORIS network of applications, each NORIS application is designed to function as an independent application.

Accomplishments 2022

In 2022, NORIS entered into a contract agreement for a new Court Diagnostic and Treatment Center (CDTC) Case Management web application; two NORIS web applications (DVHRT and JRI Dashboard); phase one of two NORIS application re-designs (NORIS E-forms and NORIS SocialWISE), in addition to our daily support roles of the existing NORIS applications and on-going data and reporting requests.




Domestic Violence High Risk Team (DVHRT) Dashboard

The Domestic Violence High Risk Team Dashboard was introduced in late July of 2022 and is used by DVHRT members to assist in identifying victims of domestic assault in order to provide them with outreach services. The dashboard provides automated client identification through integration with the Danger Assessment Law Enforcement (DALE) module within the ReportWISE application, case management of accepted clients into the program, in addition to meeting management to review new cases and update on-going cases. NORIS programming staff worked closely with the Lucas County Prosecutor's Office on the design and development of this web application. *The project was funded through FY19 Justice Assistance Grant (IAG) funding. (2019-IG-D01-3100).*

The Justice Reinvestment Initiative (JRI) Dashboard

The Justice Reinvestment Initiative (JRI) Dashboard was introduced in early 2022, allowing both law enforcement and reentry service providers to access the data of recently released Ohio Department of Rehabilitation and Correction (ODRC) inmates back into Lucas County. NORIS worked closely with ODRC staff to develop an integration service allowing for the daily retrieval of ODRC data in order to provide up-to-date information within the JRI Dashboard. The project is funded by a FY19 Justice Reinvestment Initiative (JRI) grant (2019-ZB-BX-0016).

Accomplishments 2022

Application Application edesigns (Affidavits)

NORIS E-Forms entered into an initial re-design phase in late 2022. This application is undergoing an extensive re-write as a web application, providing a more streamlined and fluid workflow for the officers writing the report. The new version of the application will allow officers to review saved reports and make needed updates for re-submission if and when needed.

When the final report is filed by the officer, it will then be displayed in a court queue for review and approval by the respective clerk of courts. The new application will also introduce integration in the form of case initiation for approved affidavits into the CLIP application, in addition to automated imaging of the report. This is a multiple-phase project with an anticipated release date of mid-2024.

NORIS SocialWISE

NORIS SocialWISE began preliminary re-design analysis in late 2022. While the application will maintain the overall functionality first introduced in the original application, linking through person records to one another criminal justice activities, the overall navigation will be re-engineered. NORIS intends to introduce a more thoughtful and streamlined approach to navigation, allowing for an improved visual experience when creating the connections between person records and viewing those connections from an investigative perspective. This is a multiple-phase project with an anticipated release date of early to mid-2024.



Administrative Services

Administration - Year in Review

2022 has brought many changes to the Criminal Justice Coordinating Council. The CJCC said goodbye to long-time Director of Administrative Services, Lisa Delaney.

In an effort to better meet the needs of the Board, Community, and staff, the CJCC redesigned its office space. The new office space has a Board Room that is equipped for in-person and remote meetings and better signage to help direct visitors of the CJCC.

The CJCC received the Ohio Auditor of State Award for exemplary financial reporting in accordance with Generally Accepted Accounting Principles (GAAP) for the year ending 2021,

The CJCC is a thirteenmember board comprised of criminal justice representatives, elected officials and citizen representatives. The Mayor of the City of Toledo and Lucas County Commissioners each appoint six members, five of whom are mandatory due to the position they hold. The sixth appointment from each jurisdiction is an appointed citizen. The thirteenth member is appointed by the CJCC and is the Chief of a suburban law enforcement agency.
